Promote your peace at the 1st Annual Mental Health Walk

Because May is Mental Health Month, and May 18 is Mental Health Action Day, Star Valley is invited to the 1st Annual Mental Health Walk taking place Thursday, May 18 from 6:30-7:30 p.m. on the Valley View Golf Course in Afton. Community members of all ages are invited to attend and participate.

Organized by Amber Titensor, who advocates for suicide prevention through her organization, Flame of Life, the walk is an opportunity for people to move their bodies, enjoy the beauties of nature, and gather as a community, which are all proven ways to support mental health.

After her son, Teagan, died by suicide only a few short years ago, Titensor determined that she would work tirelessly to reach everyone possible in spreading a message of love and encouragement to those who are in mental or emotional crisis.

"I decided to do the Star Valley Flame of Life organization and we did our first event in September," shared Titensor in an interview with SVI News Monday. "I wanted to keep the annual event, but I also knew I wanted to add more things throughout the year so there were more things happening with suicide prevention throughout the year. May is mental health



awareness month and I learned that the 18th is Mental Health Action Day, which is just taking it from mental health awareness to mental health action. If it's Mental Health Action Day, we better do something! Taking May into consideration and the busyness of it, I figured a walk was something that was pretty simple and straightforward and easy."

Valley View Golf Course has offered

their grounds for the walk. Participants can expect the event to open with a brief presentation of educational information about mental health. Everyone can take their walk, filling their brain cells with oxygen and their vision with the beauty of the scenery along the course. Following the walk, light refreshments will be served, and participants can expect to take home a joy journal and some educa-

tional materials to help maintain action in supporting their mental health.

"Bryce [at Valley View] was really great," said Titensor. "He was very gracious and very kind and very willing to let us use the course and use the pro shop facilities there. The location ended up being perfect, because it's movement of our body in a beautiful location of being in nature, and hopefully there will be some connection with the community of people gathering together, and those are all ways we can support our mental health."

Titensor hopes that the community will find the walk invigorating and beneficial. "I think that this is a really fun, light-hearted opportunity for people to just get out. This is a great opportunity for people to do something active and learn about things we can do to really help support our mental health. It will be perfect to do with your family or a group of friends or maybe a team or a community that you're a part of. It's an opportunity to meet new people, but it's a really easy, light-hearted, fun and effective way to support your mental health in that moment and then also just learn what to do at other times to support your health in other ways. There's that education aspect to it."

Titensor knows the value of awareness and education in supporting our loved ones and community members in mental and emotional need. "It's important that we not only talk about it for others, but that we learn how to help support ourselves. I've been talking a lot since losing Teagan about loving and supporting those around you and I think it's really important that we learn to support ourselves and our own mental health as well."

National BBQ Month

After a really long winter, May is finally here bringing warmer weather and the desire to be outside as much as possible. This is a perfectly good reason why this month is National BBQ Month! National BBQ Month was founded in 1963 by the Barbecue Council to encourage outdoor cooking, and since then grilling, has become extremely popular.

What is not to love about being in the warm sun, the fresh air, and smelling that mouthwatering aroma of grilled food? When it comes to grilling, meat is usually the star of the show. But did you know that you can make some delicious desserts right on the grill?

Here is one of my favorite desserts to make on the grill. It is a super simple dessert topped with ice cream that is perfect for outdoors with those fresh peaches!

Grilled pound cake and peaches!

For this recipe, you will need:
6 slices of pound cake (approximately ¾ inch thick)

- 1 ½ sticks of butter
- ½ Cup of honey
- ½ tsp. Ground cinnamon
- ¼ tsp. Ground nutmeg
- ⅛ tsp. Salt
- 6 Peaches
- Ice cream of your choice

Directions:

Melt the 1/2 stick of butter in the microwave and set aside for now.

In a small saucepan over medium heat, combine the remaining 1 stick of butter, honey, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Heat until butter is melted, then dip peach halves in the mixture.

Grill the peaches for 5 minutes, then flip them, cover, and grill for 5 more minutes. Carefully remove them from the grill, slice each peach half in quarters and cover to keep warm.

While the peaches are on the grill,

continue to heat the honey butter mixture until thick and caramelized, about ten minutes. It will thicken as it cools down, so be cautious. If you find it's too thick, add some cream or milk and heat it to loosen it back up.

Once the peaches are off the grill, brush both sides of each pound cake slice with the melted butter. Grill them for about 2 minutes per side, until the slices are crisp and golden.

Top the grilled pound cake with grilled peaches, cold ice cream, warm honey-butter sauce, and enjoy!

A couple of my favorite recipe books for grilling are "Serial Griller" by Matt Moore and "Feeding The Fire" by Joe Carroll. They both have exceptional tips and tricks for grilling and the recipes are amazing. Whether you are a pro or a newbie to grilling, you will love these books.

◆ "Steelheart"

Imagine if suddenly a large portion of the earth's population had superpowers. We've seen it before. Heroes and Villains pitting themselves against each other to save, control or destroy humanity. But imagine, if you will, that there are no Superheroes...only Supervillains. That whatever gave these Supers their power took all goodness from them. This is what you will find in this Young Adult series written by Brandon Sanderson.

Ten years ago an unexplainable flash in the sky, known as Calamity, an-

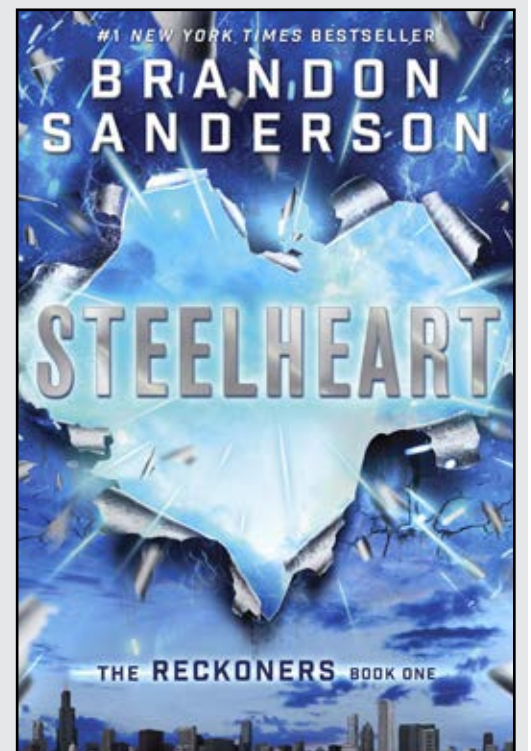
nounced the beginning of the Epics, regular humans changed in an instant into super beings. At first, there was hope that Epics would help the weak and make the world a better place. David's father was a believer in such a future. But David's father is dead, murdered by an Epic going by the name Steelheart.

Now, living in the crumbling city that used to be Chicago, David seeks out the Reckoners. The only humans brave or brash enough to challenge Epics. The Reckoners study Epics, try to discern a weakness before assassinating them in fruitless acts of revenge. But even they are not looking to take down the invulnerable Steelheart who has named himself Emperor of the region.

No one who has challenged Steelheart lives. He has surrounded himself with the strongest Epics and doesn't appear to have a weakness. But as a child David saw Steelheart bleed, and he intends to take the self-proclaimed Emperor out of

the picture for murdering his father.

Sanderson, a master of his craft, has produced numerous works of fantasy and science fiction that have been delighting readers for decades. Steelheart is a fast-paced, action-filled, exciting story with a quirky intelligent protagonist that constantly makes bad metaphors, bringing lightness and humor to what otherwise might be a heavy story. One of the things I love most about Sanderson's writing is his characters generally feel real. They make mistakes, they have to think things out. Sanderson is also a master world builder. His plots are intriguing across the board, even though he writes from Middle School to Adult. Usually there is a twist or three that are unexpected, and best of all, everything makes sense and is believable (within the world in which the stories take place). Not every book is for everyone, but for me...Steelheart was an incredible adventure.

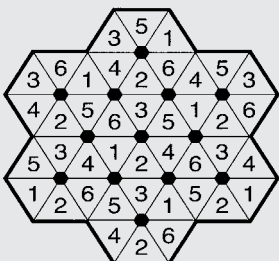

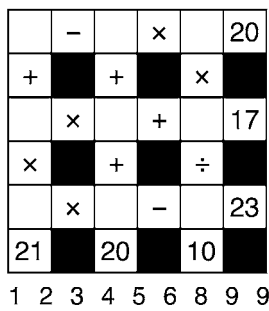

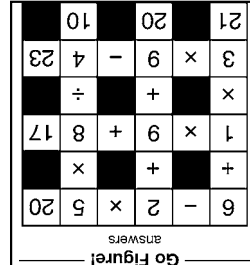

Records fall at 4A West Regionals

In a season of challenges pertaining to record snowfall and a lingering spring runoff, the SVHS Track and Field teams have persevered and found plenty of success. This past weekend they were in Cody for the 4A West Regionals where the Lady Braves rode a handful of spectacular individual performances to a third-place finish and the Braves placed fifth.

"The meet went amazing," said head coach Ty Draney. "You can expect a few minor catastrophes in championship season but we're proud of the resilience and focus the athletes showed this weekend."

As pointed out by Draney, the program brought home nine event championships out of 36 events.

"Anytime you can take away a fourth of the wins is a heck of a weekend," he added. "The team score didn't shake out because of the depth of the other teams but we're excited to lace 'em up and have the battle royale in Casper this week."

Junior Valerie Jirak continues to make the SVHS record book her own personal journal as she shattered the long-standing 100-Meter record with a time of 12.06. The previous mark of 12.30 held by Lisa Hale ('87) and tied by Kima Wells ('99) had stood for nearly 40 years. Jirak also won the 400 Meter event, the High Jump and combined with Grace Collins, Ava Morgan and Kammi Merritt to obliterate their own 4 x 100 Relay record set just last week. The four event championships and two new school records line up with some of the best all-time performances in SVHS Track and Field history.

"A few come to mind from those distance boys in 2016-17 and Val in the Indoor season," Draney said. "Ivy Myers at State, Dave Draney at State. This is definitely one for the ages. We'll go over and it will be fun to watch Val go up against them all."

Another impressive effort was that of Merritt who competed in three events on Saturday en route to winning the 200 Meter, the 300-Meter Hurdles and then nearly ran the 4x400 Meter Relay team to a come-from-behind championship.

Finally, not to be forgotten, Ava Morgan smashed the 100-Meter Hurdles school record set in 2014 by Aspen Heward and also placed second in the aforementioned 4x400 and the Triple Jump.

The Braves got a pair of regional championship performances from their distance runners as Habtamu Wetzel took the 1600 Meter run and Peter Lorch claimed the 3200 Meter event. The pair combined with Matt Heywood and Henk Visser for a top-three finish in the 4 x 800 Meter Relay.

It was a season of growth and learning and a young group of players got better each time out as the Lady Braves wrapped their soccer season this past Thursday in a 7-2 loss to the Natrona Fillies as part of the 4A West Regionals.

The loss ended the Lady Braves' season. Ultimately the Jackson Lady Broncs upset top-seed Riverton in the semifinals and went on to defeat Kelly Walsh for the regional crown, 2-1. Riverton bounced back with a 2-1 win over Natrona in the third-place match.

"[It] was an incredible heart breaker for our team," head coach Jessica Bagley replied. "We were starting to peak with implementing some defensive techniques that would win us the ball that really kept us ahead in the matches."

"We started off with a header from Senior Kylee Erickson, that was one that will be in my memory forever it was so beautiful," Bagley continued. "Natrona answered back quickly and then we had an awkward bounce off of a cleared ball that resulted in our own goal. From there we lost our momentum. Junior Willow Aullman was able

to fight to get us another goal in the game. But it was truly a hard match. So, hard for our girls to do really well against the first place team Riverton and then have some pretty steep losses against a couple of other teams in our region."

Bagley detailed what needs to happen for the program to get back to the State tournament.

"The lessons we learned this season surmount any score of any game," she said. "The girls will carry some good character traits that they have developed through this season and they worked through

many hard things. The scores will never show anyone outside of the team what was accomplished by the girls this year. We are excited to have had a roster where almost every player had a chance to score, and six different players with goals. We are improving, and we hope we can get the community excited to help us assist in building this program. With no other programs outside of high school, aside from a short rec season for younger kids, our athletes really have the ability to compete. We just need it to become more consistent. We have a real shot at being competitive in our region."

Braves knock off Riverton to earn State berth

For the third straight season, the Star Valley Braves Soccer team has had a measure of success but found themselves in an underdog spot heading into a Regional elimination match. And for the third straight year, they made sure it was someone else heading home and earned a trip to the State tournament.

This past weekend the #5 Braves were closely matched with #4 seed Riverton, a team they had tied in Afton just five days before. With the commencement of the 77th minute, Star Valley trailed the Wolverines 1-0 and was looking for a game-changer. It came in the form of Jesus Allred who rifled a shot past a disconcerted Wolverine keeper just inside the right post to tie the match with less than

three minutes left in regulation.

The action continued where Kayson Haderlie was able to blast a penalty kick into the net in the first overtime period and a 2-1 Braves lead. It is an advantage they did not relinquish as they sent Riverton home and earned a trip back to Rock Springs this week for State action.

"The goal was to win the first game and make it to State," replied head coach Trevor Spencer. "If that was the first goal, we felt good about accomplishing that. We felt like we matched up well against Riverton. I admit that at the end of regulation, I was losing a little faith and then when Jesus scored, it reignited the flame. It was a fun way to win. It's a fun thing to be a part of."

The win put Star Valley into the 4A West semifinals where they faced undefeated and top-ranked Kelly Walsh. The Braves battled and ultimately lost to the Trojans 4-1. The result then put them into a third-place game with Jackson.

"We knew after we had won that game we had Kelly Walsh," Spencer added. "I

think in that game and in the Jackson game the boys played hard. We left a lot of what we had in that Riverton game and the guys were banged up a little bit and they did a good job of fighting through those aches and pains and getting better."

The Broncs also defeated the Braves 4-1 while the Trojans rolled the Natrona Mustangs in the final, 7-1. It was a match-up that was a result of a Bronc forfeit in the semifinals after they had seemingly won the game 2-0. It was determined Jackson had an extra player listed on their roster and were forced to give up the win, but this was not discovered until after the match was played.

This week, the Braves return to Rock Springs for State and take on East champion Cheyenne Central at 11 am on Thursday. The Broncs will take on Thunder Basin.

"We played Central last year in the state tournament and ended up losing that game 2-1," Spencer said. "There are some returning players from last season. They

pass the ball really well and they have some good attacking players in the mid-field. They have proven they are the East champs for a reason. We've seen some great teams here in the West and we play the game because we don't know the score beforehand. We're going to go out and do our best and see if we can upset them."

One of the team strengths the Braves will lean on will be a belief in themselves and in each other.

"One thing I can highlight is that this team, chemistry-wise, this is the closest team I've been able to be the head coach of," Spencer concluded. "They have stuck together and rallied around each other and they are good friends. On the road they get along with each other. To see that form has been great to see. Other people are starting to notice that as well. Other coaches pointed out what a great group of guys we have and how respectful and how they cheered each other on and got along. They are going to give everything they have."

Jim Keeley has been making a difference in children’s lives for the past 40 years as a teacher in three of Star Valley’s elementary schools.

He was among the faculty and staff honored by the Lincoln County School District No. 2 Board of Trustees May 10, 2023.

Keeley opened his teaching career in Star Valley. “I started in 1983 at the Thayne school, teaching second grade for three years and then fifth grade for eight years,” Keeley said in an interview with SVI Media and aired on the Weekday Wake Up program.

“Then I transferred to the Upper Valley at Osmond for second grade, then transferred to third grade in Osmond, then I went to the pod system and taught third grade.” He continued, “Then [continued] in the new Afton school, I taught third and second grades. I will be retiring from second grade.”

Looking back on those years, he offered, “It’s a

good thing. I love the kids and I love teaching.”

Asked if he had kept track of student numbers, he offered with a smile, “I have not kept a count, but I did teach two boys for three years, first second and fifth grade and they both survived.”

In addition, he went on to teach one of the student’s own children in later years.

Over the four decades, Keeley has watched the approach to education develop and change.

“The changes have been mostly how teaching is being approached,” he said. “In the early days, we developed a curriculum around what kids wanted to learn,” he recalled.

“One year we studied about whales. We measured whales, we found out how fast they swam, we read books about whales. Now the curriculum is set for us and we have to follow that and back then there wasn’t as much testing as there is today.”

As for retirement, he said “It’s going to be very hard. Yet at the same time I’m happy to be retiring.”

Keeley continued, “Forty years has been a great thing for me here in Star Valley. My family has grown up. They have married boys from Star Valley. Now my forty years are over I will be doing other things. Helping the valley, hopefully serving in other places and working with other people.”

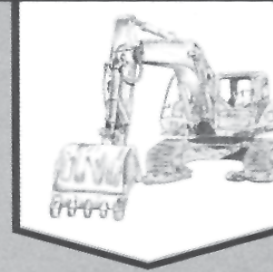

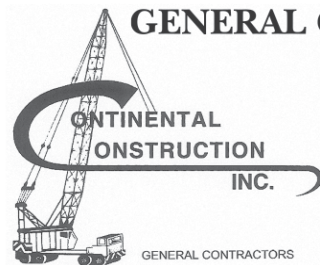

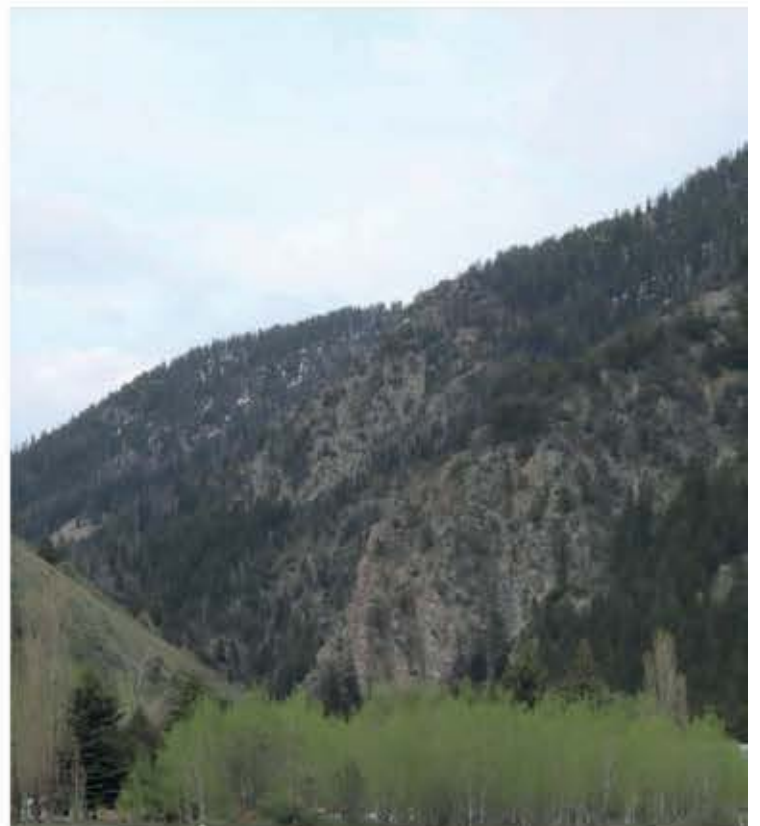
